Bills paid this week:

- ✓ Catholic Mutual Group: \$2009.00 for quarterly church property insurance.
- ✓ Anytime Fuel: \$658.58 for heating oil for the rectory
- ✓ Maintenance: \$60.00 for sanding and painting last candle stand in St. Jude Shrine and clearing and pruning the grape vine on the left side of the church.
- ✓ Miscellaneous: \$78.34 for paper towels, toilet paper, garbage bags, plastic cups, and supplies for coffee hour.
- ✓ Gomez Farewell Party: \$122.45 for pizza, cups, table cloths, and soda
- ✓ Gifts to Anytime Fuel Staff: \$31.90 for flowers and candy for giving us discounted prices on oil.
- ✓ Maintenance: \$23.97 for paint for rectory screen door and sand paper.
- ✓ Total bills paid this week: \$2,984.25. Total collected this week: \$6,857.00. We had a surplus this week of \$3,872.75 due to the \$5,000.00 Building Fund donation. Without that, we would have had a deficit. For the Fiscal Year, which began September 1, 2022, we have a surplus now of \$9,699.22 in 28 weeks. Our spectrum of donations on a regular basis runs from \$3.00 per week to \$100.00 per week. The parishioners giving toward the higher end of the range are not necessarily the wealthiest, but they have made a commitment to God to give back a larger portion of their finances. It all belongs to God anyway. God says in Proverbs; Chapter 3, verse 9: "Honor the Lord with thy substance, of all thine increase, and with your first fruits". This is a command, not a request, from God!

Memorial donations, funeral offerings, priest stole offerings, and baptism offerings are included in the regular collection totals.

What feast is called the "Feast of the Swallows" in Central Europe? Every year in late March, an ancient annual event coincides with the Feast of the Annunciation. During the Middle Ages, when the date for Christmas was settled, the date of the Annunciation Feast, a growing devotion at the time, was also fixed. It was set for March 25th, nine months prior to Christmas. In Austria and Germany, the feast took on the affectionate name "Feast of Swallows". The little birds had migrated in the same pattern since time began, flying south for the winter and returning to central Europe just as the buds began to swell in late March. Legendarily, the swallows spent the winter in Nazareth. The medieval people quickly noted that the swallows' punctual return occurred close to the feast day. Surely, it could be no coincidence that the feast occurred at the time the little swallows returned to build their nests on churches and homes. In vivid, quick medieval imagination, the swallows symbolized the virtues of the Theotokos. They looked at the docile little birds peeking from their mud houses and thought of the purity and obedience and humility of the Blessed Virgin. The "Feast of Swallows" meant all that one Abbot Gueranger put into words centuries later: "She, the humble maid of Nazareth, is to have the ineffable happiness of becoming the Mother of God, and yet the treasure of her Virginity is to be left to her! Mary bows down before this sovereign will, and says to the heavenly messenger: `Behold the Handmaid of the Lord; be it done to me according to thy word.' The Blessed Mother's eager obedience reminds and inspires us to do as God asks with equal willingness.—Taken from *The* Catholic Company website

Church Etiquette: Below are listed some things that you should adhere to at church:

- 1. Bathroom: Many people drive long distances or have little children. While not always possible, please use the conference room bathroom before Liturgy or after. It is a distraction to the Liturgy to have people walking through the sacristy. If you need to use the conference room bathroom, please use one of the church entrances/exits and enter by the church office door. The doors to the hall will be open during Liturgy, so folks can also use the hall bathrooms, if they can navigate the stairs. Also, the outside doors to the hall will be open for those who cannot navigate the stairs.
- 2. Please do not come into the sacristy area before Liturgy. If you need to tell something to the priest, email or call, otherwise wait until Liturgy is over. There are preparations going on for the service and people entering the sacristy causes distraction.
- 3. We are doing a good job of putting the booklets with the binders facing up in the pew holders. Please return all bulletins and papers that you are not taking home to the place you pick them up in the rear of the church.
- 4. If you are bringing bread for a memorial, please let Father Dennis know in advance, so he will not have to prepare the antidiron. Also, please bring it no later than a half hour of the start of the Liturgy, so that there is not a rush to properly display it.
- 5. If we have a procession, it should be done silently and with reverence. There should be no talking.
- 6. For the Little and Great Entrances, please get the fans, candles, and crosses well before we start, so there is not a rush to get them, line up properly, and be ready when the priest comes out of the Holy Place to start.
- 7. When you enter the church before Liturgy, you should be silent. Socializing should take place after Liturgy. Be aware if anyone is trying to pray, and if so, please move the conversation after Liturgy outside or to the conference room.
