- ✓ Miscellaneous: \$51.63 for flour for communion bread, spoons for coffee hour, cleaning supplies for church, toilet paper, and garbage bags.
- Total bills paid this week: \$58.63. Total collected this week: \$1,866.00. We had a surplus this week of \$1,807.37. For the Fiscal Year, which began September 1, 2022, we have a surplus now of \$9,096.27 in 30 weeks. Our spectrum of donations on a regular basis runs from \$3.00 per week to \$100.00 per week. The parishioners giving toward the higher end of the range are not necessarily the wealthiest, but they have made a commitment to God to give back a larger portion of their finances. It all belongs to God anyway! God says in Proverbs; Chapter 3, verse 9: "Honor the Lord with thy substance, of all thine increase, and with your first fruits". Meditation of the Day: "Jesus Christ could have appeared among us, radiant with joy and encompassed by divine splendor, amidst the glitter and pomp of His sovereign majesty. He deemed it more worthy of His glory and more profitable to the salvation of women and men, to show Himself to them girt with a diadem (crown) of thorns, clothed in purple and stained with blood, His face bruised, the gaping grimace of death on His lips, bearing the bloody unction of the nails imprinted on His hands and feet. In uniting himself closely and suffering, Jesus Christ assuredly did not smooth all its severity and all its pangs; but He removed part of the bitterness, corrected and destroyed its poison, He made the chalice of His Blood fruitful. Like the brazen serpent set up by Moses in the desert, He implanted Himself in the center of the world as an inexhaustible instrument of mercy, life, and health. Owing to this transformation, His divine wounds, like fountains ever gushing, remain eternally open to all straying and fallen souls who are eager to escape from their coarse, sensual aspirations, wanting to immerse themselves anew in the joys of sacrifice and the honor of purity."—Father Charles Arminjon

Why did we carry palms last weekend? What is the significance of these particular tree branches? Palm Sunday. A special blessing, a distribution, a procession. You grip the greenery in your hand. This frail spike is now a sword of protection and bearer of graces-but how did it become so special? Why were palms singled out to receive unique blessings? The answer lies back in the warm valleys of Jericho---3,000 years previous to the moment you held your blessed palm branch. Date palms were very important to the Jews as they traversed the land with household, tent, and livestock. The palms revealed the presence of a lush valley. This meant food, shelter, nearby water, and even building materials.

It is no surprise, then, that carrying a branch in one's hand came to signify joy! In the book of Maccabees, in the Old Testament, the Jews who remained faithful to the Torah fought to regain Israel from the Greek pagans. When they liberated Jerusalem, the faithful Jews rushed to the palms and cut boughs from them. They entered Jerusalem holding the palms to express their jubilance. A sense of victory was therefore added to the joy symbolized in the palm branch. That is why the people of Jerusalem greeted Our Lord with palm branches and "Hosannas" when He came into the city of Jerusalem, ("Hosanna" is a one word prayer meaning Rescue! Save! Intervene!).He was their king, leader, their healer, their provider, and they rejoiced at his arrival. Since that time we have carried palms the week before Easter to welcome Jesus as our King! The palms are our proclamation of Him as a conquering hero, victorious over death itself.---From The Catholic Company Website

Who was the mysterious Simon of Cyrene? Do we know much about the "passer -by" who helped Jesus carry His cross? The Gospels say very little about the man who carried the cross to Golgotha with Jesus. In fact, only one sentence is dedicated to him in three Gospels. The fourth does not mention him at all. All we know of Simon from the Scriptures is that he was a native of Cyrene, a large city in northern Africa, and had sons named Alexander and Rufus. We learn more about him from one of the Church's modern mystics and visionaries: Blessed Anne Catherine Emmerich. Blessed Anne received visions of the Blessed Mother's life and of Jesus' passion. She says this about Simon: "At this moment, when Jesus fell under the weight of the cross and suffering tremendous blood loss, pain from the scourging, and dehydration-- Simon of Cyrene, a pagan, happened to pass by, accompanied by his children. He was a gardener, just returning home after working in a garden near the eastern wall of the city of Jerusalem, and carrying a bundle of branches."

Blessed Anne explains that the Romans chose him to help Jesus because he was a pagan. The Roman soldiers did not want to risk offending any of the Jews by making them help, but a pagan could not refuse. Simon was disgusted with Jesus' condition and tried to refuse. How could the Romans expect him, an honorable man, to walk with and assist a dirty, mutilated criminal? The Romans, however, forced him to take up the cross. Then everything changed. Simon has not carried the cross after Jesus any length of time before his heart was deeply touched by grace.

That is the last we hear of Simon himself, but Blessed Anne's words leave us with the hope and expectation that he became a Christian. It is likely that he did. After all, it is believed that his sons became well known Christians, because Saint Mark mentioned them by name (Gospel of Mark, Chapter 15, verse 21).---From The Catholic Company Website

A saint of whom you may not have heard! Saint Columba is the patron saint of bookbinders, poets, and Ireland. Legend has it that around 560, Columba became involved in a war, which resulted in the deaths of many people. As penance, Columba went to Scotland to work as a missionary to convert as many people as he had killed in the battle. Columba reputedly wrote several hymns and more than 300 books in his lifetime. He died in 597, and although he spent much of his life in Scotland, he is one of the patron saints of Ireland, along with Saint Patrick and Saint Brigid.

## Church Etiquette: Below are listed some things that you should adhere to at church:

- 1. Bathroom: Many people drive long distances or have little children. While not always possible, please use the conference room bathroom before Liturgy or after. It is a distraction to the Liturgy to have people walking through the sacristy. If you need to use the conference room bathroom, please use one of the church entrances/exits and enter by the church office door. The doors to the hall will be open during Liturgy, so folks can also use the hall bathrooms, if they can navigate the stairs. Also, the outside doors to the hall will be open for those who cannot navigate the stairs.
- 2. Please do not come into the sacristy area before Liturgy. If you need to tell something to the priest, email or call, otherwise wait until Liturgy is over. There are preparations going on for the service and people entering the sacristy causes distraction.
- 3. We are doing a good job of putting the booklets with the binders facing up in the pew holders. Please return all bulletins and papers that you are not taking home to the place you pick them up in the rear of the church.
- 4. If you are bringing bread for a memorial, please let Father Dennis know in advance, so he will not have to prepare the antidiron. Also, please bring it no later than a half hour of the start of the Liturgy, so that there is not a rush to properly display it.
- 5. If we have a procession, it should be done silently and with reverence. There should be no talking.
- 6. For the Little and Great Entrances, please get the fans, candles, and crosses well before we start, so there is not a rush to get them, line up properly, and be ready when the priest comes out of the Holy Place to start.
- 7. When you enter the church before Liturgy, you should be silent. Socializing should take place after Liturgy. Be aware if anyone is trying to pray, and if so, please move the conversation after Liturgy outside or to the conference room.
