Am I doing something wrong, if my prayer feels "dry"? Actually, you are being offered the opportunity of doing something right. Every soul experiences a feeling of "dryness" at various times in its prayer life.

Many of the Saints experienced these periods, called "spiritual desolation", repeatedly with great intensity. The <u>Catechism of the Catholic Church</u> describes the feeling as a time when "the heart is separated from God, with no taste for thoughts, memories, and feelings, even spiritual ones".

Sometimes God allows a soul this period of dryness as a chance to grow in spiritual strength. This might sound alarming, but do not worry! God never overtaxes a soul. He only permits tests that the soul is capable of overcoming, and which will help the soul grow closer to Him through virtue.

If we only experienced feelings of consolation and happiness during our prayer time, our imperfect souls would grow attached to those feelings, rather than to God. That means we would not really know or love Him for who He really is.

So dryness in prayer is often a means of spiritual growth and maturity by which we can develop unshakeable faith in God. Proving our faith takes total trust, perseverance, and love. It is difficult. It is a battle! It is "sheer faith, clinging to Jesus in His agony and his tomb", as the Catechism expresses it.

When we push through dryness in prayer, we have to use the above-mentioned virtues consistently. By exercising all these virtues, we strengthen them and grow in them.

Think of how Our Risen Lord asked Peter three times if he loved Him. Peter had to keep replying, "Lord, You know that I love You".

When we feel discouraged in prayer, God is gently asking, "Do you love Me? Will you pursue Me even when it is difficult, when I seem far away?" He wants to hear us answer again and again, like Peter, "Yes, Lord, I do love You!"

NOTES, UPCOMING EVENTS, AND IMPORTANT INFORMATION:

Altar servers for the main altar: Our servers have done a good job serving on the altar, despite not having formal training. As a result, at times, the priest has to alert them during the Liturgy of what they need to do and when. This should not be occurring for a regular Divine Liturgy. When I was an altar server I had to go through extensive training, be able to read the Mass in Latin, and then had to serve as an assistant server to a main server for 6 months. It was a lot, but we knew what to do and helped the Mass flow smoothly, without distraction. Therefore, commencing next weekend, anyone wishing to serve on the alter will be required to attend 2 instructional sessions, of two hours each session, covering proper attire (shirt with a collar-no hoody sweatshirts), proper shoes (no sneakers but rather black dress shoes), the function of the altar server, the names associated with the various parts of the church, the different objects that are used in the Liturgy, the theological meaning and significance of which the server is participating, and many other items including the proper decorum for an altar server. To serve on the altar, the individual must take this course. Once completed, the individual will be presented a certificate and be permitted to serve in the Holy Place. Additionally, to serve on the altar, one is required to be vested. The only exceptions to having to take these classes are the Subdeacons. The classes will be held on Sunday, May 14 and 21 from 11:30 to 1:30. Lunch will be provided. All interested, please sign the sheet in the back of the church After next weekend, until the classes are completed, we will have no altar servers on the altar, except the Subdeacons. Thank you! Church Etiquette: Below are listed some things that you should adhere to at church:

- 1. Bathroom: Many people drive long distances or have little children. While not always possible, please use the conference room bathroom before Liturgy or after. It is a distraction to the Liturgy to have people walking through the sacristy. If you need to use the conference room bathroom, please use one of the church entrances/exits and enter by the church office door. The doors to the hall will be open during Liturgy, so folks can also use the hall bathrooms, if they can navigate the stairs. Also, the outside doors to the hall will be open for those who cannot navigate the stairs.
- 2. Please do not come into the sacristy area before Liturgy. If you need to tell something to the priest, email or call, otherwise wait until Liturgy is over. There are preparations going on for the service and people entering the sacristy causes distraction.
- 3. We are doing a good job of putting the booklets with the binders facing up in the pew holders. Please return all bulletins and papers that you are not taking home to the place you pick them up in the rear of the church.
- 4. If you are bringing bread for a memorial, please let Father Dennis know in advance, so he will not have to prepare the antidiron. Also, please bring it no later than a half hour of the start of the Liturgy, so that there is not a rush to properly display it.
- 5. If we have a procession, it should be done silently and with reverence. There should be no talking.

- 6. For the Little and Great Entrances, please get the fans, candles, and crosses well before we start, so there is not a rush to get them, line up properly, and be ready when the priest comes out of the Holy Place to start.
- 7. When you enter the church before Liturgy, you should be silent. Socializing should take place after Liturgy. Be aware if anyone is trying to pray, and if so, please move the conversation after Liturgy outside or to the conference room.
