Many do not see the connection between thoughts about the King and the service of the King; between the interior silence and the continual detachment. If we look closer, it will be seen that there is a strong, close, unbreakable link between the two. Find a recollected (calm, undisturbed, unshaken) person, and the person will be detached; seek one who is detached, and she or he will be recollected. To have one is to have the other. Meet the little known "Doctor of the Church", who formed more Doctors: Behind every great Spanish saint, there is Saint John of Avila, or so it seems! John was the close friend and spiritual director of many saints in the 16th century, including Saint Teresa of Avila, Saint John of the Cross, and Saint Ignatius of Loyola. John was born into a wealthy family and thought that the law would be his profession. After studying at university, he became disgusted with what he saw of the court and returned home. For a few years he lived with his parents in great austerity. He eventually left for Alcala and studied to be ordained a priest.

After his ordination, he gave away all his wealth and prepared to go to Mexico as a missionary, but this was not meant to be. The Archbishop of Seville heard about his sanctity and his talent as a preacher. Sending for John, he persuaded him (with great difficulty) to give up the Mexico idea and instead re-evangelize southern Spain, beginning with Andalusia. It took one sermon to make John famous. Crowds flocked to hear him, absorbing his exhortations and admonitions. At one time he was investigated by the Spanish Inquisition due to some false accusations, but this only increased his popularity among the faithful.

In addition to preaching missions, John also helped form some of the greatest Spanish saints. He helped Saint Ignatius promote his society of Jesus (the Jesuits), he instructed young men who later helped Saint John of the Cross reform the Carmelites, and he assisted Saint Teresa of Avila with her *Autobiography*, to name a few of his many accomplishments. For years, John journeyed throughout southern Spain, stirring lukewarm faithful into fiery devotion to Christ. His last 18 years were marked with constant illnesses, but these sufferings did not stop him from preaching and instructing. At his death, John was surrounded by his friends and spiritual children, who prayed with him, as he offered his last sufferings to the crucified Christ.---From the Catholic Company website

NOTES, UPCOMING EVENTS, AND IMPORTANT INFORMATION:

Church Etiquette: Below are listed some things that you should adhere to at church:

- 1. Bathroom: Many people drive long distances or have little children. While not always possible, please use the conference room bathroom before Liturgy or after. It is a distraction to the Liturgy to have people walking through the sacristy. If you need to use the conference room bathroom, please use one of the church entrances/exits and enter by the church office door. The doors to the hall will be open during Liturgy, so folks can also use the hall bathrooms, if they can navigate the stairs. Also, the outside doors to the hall will be open for those who cannot navigate the stairs.
- 2. Please do not come into the sacristy area before Liturgy. If you need to tell something to the priest, email or call, otherwise wait until Liturgy is over. There are preparations going on for the service and people entering the sacristy causes distraction.
- 3. We are doing a good job of putting the booklets with the binders facing up in the pew holders. Please return all bulletins and papers that you are not taking home to the place you pick them up in the rear of the church.
- **4.** If you are bringing bread for a memorial, please let Father Dennis know in advance, so he will not have to prepare the antidiron. Also, please bring it no later than a half hour of the start of the Liturgy, so that there is not a rush to properly display it.
- **5.** If we have a procession, it should be done silently and with reverence. There should be no talking. For the Little and Great Entrances, please get the fans, candles, and crosses ready well before the priest comes from the altar. This prevents the last minute rush and distraction.

Announcement from the Bishop: The Eparchy has undertaken a review of the entire Eparchy's legally required mandates and determined that certain reforms are warranted. These reforms will include the addition of two non-voting lay members to the Eparchy's governing body, typically called the "Board of Directors". These individuals will be active participants in the deliberations of the governing body and will bring to it the voice of the laity. You must be over the age of 21 and 1) canonically Melkite, 2) regularly participate in the liturgical life of the parish, and 3) ready, willing, and able to serve as lay members of the governing board.
