Why John and James are called the "sons of thunder". Their fiery zeal and energy earned these bothers a nickname directly from Our Lord! Boisterous, bold, and brave, the Apostles James and John earned this dramatic nickname from our Lord through their, occasionally misplaced, zeal and passion. James and his brother John were the sons of Zebedee. Although fishermen, these brothers immediately cast aside their nets when Jesus invited them to become "fishers of men". This immediate, zealous reaction to drop everything to follow Christ is indicative of how these two men lived.

Just as their zeal led them to abandon their fishing nets, their fiery spirits could sometimes lead to extreme actions. These instances of the "thunderous" behavior occur throughout the Gospels. When James and John heard a man casting out devils in Jesus' Name, they forbade him to do that. Later, when the Samaritans give Jesus a cold reception, James and John are furious. They ask Jesus, "Lord, do you want us to call down fire from heaven to consume them?"

In both instances, Jesus rebukes them and demonstrates to these brothers the simple humility required to live out the message of the Messiah. Their faith and friendship with Jesus helped form them into zealous, but humble disciples of Christ.

To the Hebrew people, thunder was the voice of God. It was powerful and terrifying. Though it could mean destruction, it could also mean rain that caused life to flourish. Thunder still brings to mind great and mysterious strength. How appropriate for these two beloved saints, who became the voice of God, to receive the nickname "Sons of Thunder".---From the Catholic Company website

The Lebanese saint who unites Christians and Muslims: Saint Charbel Makhlouf is known in Lebanon for the miraculous healings of those who visit his tomb to seek his intercession---both Christians and Muslims. "Saint Charbel has no geographic or confessional limits. Nothing is impossible for his intercession and when people ask for something, he answers," Father Louis Matar, coordinator of the Shrine of Saint Charbel in Annaya, Lebanon, told the Catholic News Agency.

Father Matar said that the shrine receives approximately 4 million visitors a year. Father Matar is responsible for archiving the thousands of medically verified healings attributed to the intercession of Saint Charbel. He said that many miraculous cures have been obtained by Muslims.

Since 1950, the year the monastery began to formally record the miraculous healings; they have archived more than 29.000 miracles. Prior to 1950, miracles were verified only through the witness of a priest. Now, with more advanced medical technology available, alleged miracles require medical documentation demonstrating the person's initial illness and later, their unexplainable good health.

One of the miracles documented by Father Matar at the end of December 2018 was that of a 45 year old Italian woman. Suffering from a neurological disease, she was hospitalized after a suicide attempt by ingesting acid. The doctors discovered that the damage to her esophagus and intestines was so extensive, "the last way possible to help her was believing in God and praying," Father Matar commented.

The woman's parents began to pray, inviting others to pray with them. A Maronite nun heard about the prayer request and gave them holy oil from the shrine. After they spread the oil on the suffering woman, she was cured. This was just one of seven miracles archived that month, Father Matar said, calling each one "a phenomenon".

Deeply devoted to God's Eucharistic presence, Saint Charbel suffered a stroke while celebrating the Divine Liturgy on December 16, 1898. He died on Christmas Eve. This is from an article written by Hannah Brockhaus of the Catholic News Agency.

NEW COMMUNICATION TOOL: The Eparchy has initiated a new communication tool called *Flocknote*. It allows the Eparchy and the parish to send emails and texts to everyone with just the click of "the mouse". I will be passing around a document at Liturgy to make sure we have everyone's current home address, email address, and cell phone number. Please read these messages when they arrive! They are not "spam"!

NOTE: There will not be a Saturday Liturgy at 5:00 pm on August 5 nor a Sunday 8:00am Liturgy on August 6. There will be a Sunday 10 am Liturgy celebrated by Father Thomas Moses on August 6. This is due to Father Dennis being on vacation from August 5 to August 12, and having no priest to cover those times. Father Elias Dorham will celebrate Liturgy on Saturday, August 12 at 5:00 pm and will concelebrate, with Father Dennis, the baptism of Kateri Brodeur prior to Liturgy on August 13. Father Dennis and Father Elias will celebrate the Liturgy together at 10am on Sunday, August 13. There will not be a Spanish/English Liturgy on Sunday, August 13 at 8:00 am due to the Baptism.

Church Etiquette: Below are listed some things that you should adhere to at church:

- 1. Bathroom: Many people drive long distances or have little children. While not always possible, please use the conference room bathroom before Liturgy or after. It is a distraction to the Liturgy to have people walking through the sacristy. If you need to use the conference room bathroom, please use one of the church entrances/exits and enter by the church office door. The doors to the hall will be open during Liturgy, so folks can also use the hall bathrooms, if they can navigate the stairs. Also, the outside doors to the hall will be open for those who cannot navigate the stairs.
- 2. Please do not come into the sacristy area before Liturgy. If you need to tell something to the priest, email or call, otherwise wait until Liturgy is over. There are preparations going on for the service and people entering the sacristy causes distraction.
- 3. We are doing a good job of putting the booklets with the binders facing up in the pew holders. Please return all bulletins and papers that you are not taking home to the place you pick them up in the rear of the church.
- 4. If you are bringing bread for a memorial, please let Father Dennis know in advance, so he will not have to prepare the antidiron. Also, please bring it no later than a half hour of the start of the Liturgy, so that there is not a rush to properly display it.
- 5. If we have a procession, it should be done silently and with reverence. There should be no talking. For the Little and Great Entrances, please get the fans, candles, and crosses ready well before the priest comes from the altar. This prevents the last minute rush and distraction. Thank you, in advance, for your cooperation! Father Dennis
